CHILD SAFETY

CHILD SAFE STANDARDS

Over the coming weeks we will present each of the new standards one-by-one, with some detail for families; Standard 1 is as follows:

• Standard 1 – Organisations establish a culturally safe environment in which the diverse and unique identities and experiences of Aboriginal children and young people are respected and valued

Note: The term 'Aboriginal' includes Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. It is important to be respectful of how individual children, students, their families and community refer to themselves, and use appropriate language when referring to individuals or communities.

Catholic educators are committed to ensuring cultural safety for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, recognising families and communities as the most significant educators of their children, and respecting their rich history and vibrant heritage (Catholic Education Commission of Victoria Ltd 2021). Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools (MACS) is dedicated to working with students, families and communities to embed cultural safety for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and young people in schools across the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

Child Safe Standard 1 (Ministerial Order No. 1359 clause 5) addresses the importance of creating culturally safe, welcoming and inclusive environments for Aboriginal children and young people, and their families. Schools must meet specific requirements relating to this standard regardless of whether there are Aboriginal children and young people currently using their services or facilities. Implementing this standard will require ongoing effort, not just a one-off change.

Cultural safety includes being provided with a safe, nurturing and positive environment where Aboriginal children:

- feel comfortable being themselves
- feel secure to express their culture and spirituality
- are supported by a school community who respect their Aboriginality, and encourage their sense of self and identity.

As explained last term, St. Paul's has been working since Semester 2 of 2021, to begin to embed the standards into our way of being and working together, to ensure the safety of all children in our care.

We have also made sure the children have been & continue to be part of this process, giving them a voice' in making sure they know what is being done to keep them safe and how they can contribute to what is being



done as well.

S.R.C. - STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL: UPDATE

Our Student Representative Council (Year 3: Emily Williams & Andrew Dinh, Year 4: Genevieve Hoang & Parker Arandez, Year 5: Dante Shearer & Sienna Renda and Year 6: Georgia Cauchi & Noah Ng) Continue to be passionate, creative, committed, organised and good at communicating.

Their responsibilities have been but are not limited to:

- sharing in decisions on school issues (e.g. school facilities, student resources)
- building relationships and school community spirit (i.e. lunchtime activities)
- responding to student concerns and needs (i.e. tackling issues such as racism, bullying, etc.)
- bringing about changes in our school community and wider community (i.e. Student Action Teams, raising & donating money to worthy causes, etc.)



CAR PARK

A concerning number of parents (& grandparents) have raised the issue of unsafe driving & parking practices in the car park, throughout Terms 1 & 2, and now in Term 3. We are very fortunate, thanks to the parish, to have car parking onsite – the majority of schools (Catholic & state) do not. All we ask of you is to think of others as you enter the car park, as you park and as you leave the car park; please be patient and think 'safety first' – the children are watching you & listening to you in the car park and it is for them & amp; their safety that we ask this of you.



Two of the projects they worked on last term were the replacement of our school flagpoles at the front of the school hall, with 3 poles flying the school flag, the Australian flag & the indigenous flag. The flagpoles have been installed and the SRC raise our flags on Monday morning and take them down on Friday afternoon. The 5 totem poles (with indigenous art work / patterning), designed to remind us all of our St. Paul's 'Behaviour Purpose Statement', "At St. Paul's Primary School we always Try our best, Act Responsibly, Respect Others and Stay Safe", have arrived and will be installed very soon.
